

Cat trapping hints and protocols

Where to set a trap?

- » Place the trap where you have sighted a cat, or think a cat might live e.g. haystack, old sheds, car bodies, grain silos, drains and vegetation corridors.
- » Don't put the trap within eyesight of the road and don't let others see you setting the trap in case of theft.
- » Traps can be hard to see so ensure you can find it again by using a marker, GPS or by drawing a map.
- Ensure the trap is in working order and the door closes correctly when triggered.
 Sometimes the latch jams or grass stops the door closing completely: trial it before walking away.
- » Set the trap on steady/ flat ground.
- » Set traps in a sheltered location (out of the sun, wind and rain).

What bait do I use?

- » Cats don't favour one bait, try what they are eating in the area (e.g. if on the coast try fish) or what is easy and cheap for you e.g. table scraps, fish, crab shells, tinned cat food or chicken wings.
- » Change bait at least every three days.
- » You may want to use gloves to keep human smell away.
- » Suspend the bait to keep it free of ants and to prevent the floor plate from jamming.

When do I check my trap?

- » Check traps frequently (every morning and evening).
- » If a non-target native animal is trapped, release it immediately.

What do I do when I catch a cat?

- » If the cat is domestic or captured within one kilometre of a residence, contact your KI Council General Inspector to help remove the cat (08) 8553 4500.
- » If the cat is more than one kilometre from a residence and identified as feral, the cat can be destroyed humanely. If needed contact your KI Council General Inspector for assistance.
- » Feral cats are extremely aggressive when caught. Handle with care and wear gloves.
- » Do not attempt to remove the cat from the trap.
- » Secure the door of the trap with a zip tie, string and/or wire.
- Prior to and while euthanising, transporting, or waiting for assistance, cover the trap with something dark (blanket, towel, hessian bag or shade-cloth) to prevent the cat stressing.

Tips for identifying domestic and feral cats

- 1. If UNSURE contact the Kangaroo Island Council General Inspector.
- 2. Feral cats are generally more aggressive but this is not always the case.
- 3. Domestic cats MUST have a microchip.
